

**Good Morning Tea (India) 5**

This hearty-flavoured English Breakfast-style Assam blend is strong and golden in the cup and at its best when taken with milk.

**Darjeeling – Sungma (India) 5**

A smooth mellow rounded tea with good body and a delicate muscatel flavour. Bright golden Coppery infusion. Finely plucked and well rolled “China” leaf with a light purplish bloom. Best taken black.

**Jin Mao Hou – Golden Monkey (China) 6**

A classic from Fujian Province and universally regarded as one of the finest black teas. Said by some to be ‘playful’ and ‘frolicsome’ on the palate, Golden Monkey is nonetheless a serious hand-made, one leaf/one bud, first flush early spring tea. Named for it’s leaves’ resemblance to monkey claws, it produces a full bodied tea with robust flavour.

**Flavoured Black Teas**

**Chai (India) 5**

A blend of fine Assam black tea, black pepper, cinnamon, cloves, dry ginger, green cardamom and nutmeg. This Masala Chai is thick, strong and liquors brightly in the cup.

**Earl Grey (India) 5**

This blend of Assam teas is flavoured and scented by oil squeezed from the skin of the orange-like bergamont.

**Lapsang Souchong (China) 6**

This black tea is smoked with pine wood during the firing process of tea manufacture. Golden in the cup with a complex palate of burnt wood flavours this tea enchants many tea aficionados.

**White Teas**

**Bai Hao Yin Zhen– Silver Needle (China) 6**

This style originated in Fujian Province, China and is traditionally produced only in the first week of the growing season, in spring. The most highly prized grade of tea, it’s velvety on the palate with a sweet floral finish.

**Green Teas**

**Yunnan Green (China) 5**

This home grown tea appears yellow green in the cup and has grassy vegetal flavours with a mild astringency on the palate.

**Genmai Cha 5**

A needle shaped sencha green tea from the famed Shizuoka district blended with roasted unhulled rice. Mildly astringent on the palate with marine, plant and roasted grain notes.

**Oolong Teas**

**Tie Guan Yin– Iron Goddess (China) 6**

Serene and contemplative as befits a tea named for the Goddess of Mercy, this partially oxidised Oolong from Fujian Province offers rounded, mildly ore-like earth tones softened with caramel, and deepened, some say, by rich, woody, orchid-like fragrance.

**Flower Teas**

**Paradise Garden 6**

A twist of premium China green tea conceals a glorious Eden deep within. This theatrical bud bursts open to reveal a red glow amaranth against chrysanthemums.

**Spring Snow 6**

This monk’s hat of premium china green tea hides a secret when steeped for 5 minutes it bursts forth to reveal an arrangement of three tiny white chrysanthemums.
