Welcome to the *Wurm Haus*: a reality-warping space created by New Zealand-born, Melbourne-based artist Jess Johnson. *The exhibition's* extraordinary centrepiece is *Ixian Gate*: a 360-degree animation experienced using Oculus Rift technology, a virtual reality system that immerses the viewer in an artificial world.

Ixian Gate's stereoscopic computer-generated environment was built using high-resolution scans of Johnson's drawings, and enables viewers to enter the alternative world depicted in these complex and highly detailed works. Ixian Gate takes its name from a planet in Frank Herbert's 1965 science-fiction novel Dune renowned for its supreme machine culture and which supplies technology to other planets. The title reflects Johnson's interest in popular culture and acknowledges the new technologies embraced by the artist to create the work.

The exhibition space's geometric patterning, visual motifs and drawings created by Johnson add an additional layer of immersion. Wurm Haus's unexpected world reflects the artist's fascination with the intersections between language, science fiction, culture and technology.
