# **SPEAKERS**

#### **WAYNE CROTHERS**

Wayne Crothers is Senior Curator of Asian Art at the National Gallery of Victoria (NGV). Before starting at the NGV he spent a total of eighteen years researching, completing a master's degree and lecturing in Japan, and has held guest lecturing residencies at the Sichuan Fine Arts Institute, China; Australian National University, Canberra; Lafayette College, Pennsylvania, USA; and the Joan Miro Foundation, Spain. Wayne is the curator of *Terracotta Warriors: Guardians of Immortality* and *Cai Guo-Qiang: The Transient Landscape*, currently on display at the NGV for the 2019 Melbourne Winter Masterpieces.

#### **ANNIKA AITKEN**

Annika Aitken is Curatorial Project Officer of Asian Art at the National Gallery of Victoria (NGV). She has been on the curatorial team for *Terracotta Warriors: Guardians of Immortality* and *Cai Guo-Qiang: The Transient Landscape* and is co-editor of the recent NGV publication *The Centre: On Art and Urbanism in China*. Prior to commencing her position at the NGV, she managed a range of permanent and temporary public art projects for City of Perth and the WA Artists' Foundation, alongside independent curatorial projects. She has studied and worked in Beijing and Hangzhou, China, and has a longstanding research interest in Australia-Asia engagement through the visual arts.

# DR SIMON MAIDMENT

Dr Simon Maidment is Senior Curator of Contemporary Art at the National Gallery of Victoria (NGV) and curator of *A Fairy Tale in Red Times: Works from the White Rabbit Collection*. His PhD research used curatorial practice as a method to investigate art's potential to influence social and political change.

#### SUSAN VAN WYK

Susan van Wyk is Senior Curator of Photography at the National Gallery of Victoria (NGV). Since joining the Gallery in 1989, she has curated numerous exhibitions of Australian and international photography, including most recently curating *Turning Points: Contemporary Photography From China*.

## PHILIPP IVANOV

Philipp Ivanov is Chief Executive Officer of Asia Society Australia. Philipp is a China specialist with extensive experience in policy, education and research. Previously, he was a manager of the Australia-China Council at the Australian Government's Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, and a policy officer on DFAT's China desk. Philipp was one of the principal authors of the Australia in the Asian Century White Paper - China Country Strategy. He has been studying China since 1993, and lived and worked in China for over 6 years. He is a fluent Chinese and Russian speaker.

## DR CLAIRE ROBERTS

Dr Claire Roberts is a historian of Chinese art and a curator. She is Associate Professor, Art History and ARC Future Fellow in the School of Culture and Communication at The University of Melbourne.





# **SPEAKERS**

#### PROF TONIA ECKFELD

Professor Tonia Eckfeld is Principal Fellow at The University of Melbourne, Distinguished Research Fellow at Northwestern Polytechnical University, Xi'an, and a consultant for documentary films on Chinese archaeology and cultural heritage. Tonia is a collaborative researcher with the Shaanxi Provincial Institute of Archaeology, Henan Provincial Administration of Cultural Heritage, Zhengzhou University and other institutions in China and worldwide. Tonia is author of the landmark book, *Imperial Tombs in Tang China*, 618–907, *The Politics of Paradise* (2005).

#### PROF ANTONIA FINNANE

Professor Finnane is a graduate of the University of Sydney and the Australian National University, with a PhD in Chinese history. Her research is in the area of urban history, the focus of her prize-winning book, *Speaking of Yangzhou: A Chinese City, 1550–1850* (Harvard, 2004). Current research, funded by the Australian Research Council, concerns production and consumption in Maoist China, with a focus on Beijing and Shanghai. Her Australian base has also meant engagement with Australia's Chinese history: she has written on Jewish migration from post-war Shanghai, and is at present researching the Chinese community in between-the-wars Perth. She has studied and worked in China for varying periods in her career, including a period of five years from 2008 to 2012. Recently retired from The University of Melbourne, she continues in an active research and training role there, with a number of PhD students under her supervision.

#### **LUISE GUEST**

Luise Guest researches and writes about contemporary Chinese art. She travels to China regularly to interview artists for the White Rabbit Collection, where she is Manager of Research. Her writing has been published in a range of online and print journals including The Journal of Contemporary Chinese Art, Art Monthly Australasia, Garland, The Art Life, Randian and Artist Profile. Her book, Half the Sky: Conversations with Women Artists in China, was published by Piper Press in 2016. Luise is currently undertaking PhD research at UNSWAD, examining the work of female artists who subvert conventions of ink painting and calligraphy.

## DR MERRIDEN VARRALL

Dr Merriden Varrall is a Nonresident Fellow at the Lowy Institute and Director of Geopolitics and Tax at KPMG. From 2014–2018, Merriden was the Director of the Lowy Institute's East Asia Program. Before joining the Institute, Merriden was the Assistant Country Director and Senior Policy Advisor at United Nations Development Programme, China, where she worked on China's role in the world, focusing on its international development cooperation policy. Prior to that she worked for the Australian Government Treasury and the Department of Family and Community Services. Merriden spent almost eight years living and working in China, including lecturing in foreign policy at the China Foreign Affairs University and conducting fieldwork for her doctoral research.





# **SPEAKERS**

#### DR ANITA ARCHER

Dr Anita Archer, academic at The University of Melbourne, has worked as an art consultant specialising in contemporary Asian art for over 15 years. She has led many VIP collector tours to the UAE and Hong Kong, and has extensive connections and experience in the art world of the region. Archer has recently completed her PhD on the international market for Chinese art titled *Global Positioning: International Auctions and the Development of the Western Market for Chinese Contemporary Art, 1998–2012.* 

#### DR JAMES LEIBOLD

Dr James Leibold has research expertise on the politics of ethnicity, race and national identity in modern Chinese history and society, and is currently engaged in research on ethnic policy-making and ethnic conflict in contemporary China with a particular focus on the restive Western frontier and its Tibetan and Uyghur ethnic minorities. He is the author and co-editor of four books and over twenty-five peer-reviewed articles and book chapters, and a frequent contributor to the international media on these topics. Dr Leibold is currently the lead Chief Investigator on an Australia Research Council funded project entitled *Urbanising Western China: Nation-building and Social Mobilisation on the Sino-Tibetan Frontier*.

## **CHUNMEI PAN**

Chunmei Pan is a PhD Candidate in the China Studies Research Centre at La Trobe University. She obtained her first PhD in Anthropology at Yunnan University in 2012.

### **VICKIE ZHANG**

Vickie Zhang is a cultural geographer and documentary maker. She is currently a PhD Student in the School of Geography at The University of Melbourne. Her PhD research considers experiences of loss under conditions of technological, environmental and economic change, looking at workers affected by recent coalmine closures in regional Australia and China. In 2014, she received a State Government of Victoria's Hamer Scholarship for language study in Nanjing, China. She currently holds The University of Melbourne's prestigious Elizabeth & Vernon Puzey Scholarship and recently received an Australian Government Endeavour Research Fellowship for fieldwork in China and the UK. Her short film 'Drum Village Primary School' premiered at the 8th Antenna Documentary Film Festival in 2018.
