Ron Mueck



The National Gallery of Victoria today opened a stunning exhibition of the work of internationally renowned sculptor Ron Mueck.

Known for his extraordinarily life-like creations, this exhibition features twelve sculptures by Mueck including four new works, never exhibited before.

This is the largest and most comprehensive Mueck exhibition ever to be held in Australia.

Frances Lindsay, Deputy Director, NGV, said: "Since his dramatic entry onto the international art stage, Mueck has continued to astound audiences with his realistic, figurative sculptures and now occupies a unique and important place in the field of international contemporary art."

David Hurlston, Curator Australian Art, NGV, said Ron Mueck's poignant sculptures illustrate timeless human conditions from birth to demise.

"Mueck's sculptures range from puckish portrayals of childhood innocence to acute observations of stages of life; from birth to adolescence, middle and old age, and even death. Many are solitary figures, psychological portraits of emotional intensity and of isolation," said Mr Hurlston.

The exhibition draws from Australian and international collections, highlights include: *Mask II* (2002), *Man in a boat* (2002), *Old woman in bed* (2002), *Wild man* (2005), *Two women* (2005), *In bed* (2005), and through the generosity of a private collector from the United States, the iconic work *Dead Dad* (1996/97).

In addition to these there are a number of new works created specifically for this exhibition which will be unveiled for the first time in Melbourne.





THE EXHIBITION (continued)

In his early career Melbourne-born Mueck worked as a puppet maker, however since 1997 he has been entirely devoted to making sculpture. In 1996, he was 'discovered' by British advertising guru Charles Saatchi, who included Mueck's *Dead Dad* as part of the history making *Sensation* exhibition the following year.

Mueck went on to be represented at the 2001 Venice Biennale, capturing worldwide attention for his 4.9 metre sculpture, *Boy* (1999). Since then, he has become one of the most significant figures in the contemporary art world.

Mueck's work is currently held in the collections of Art Gallery of NSW, National Gallery of Australia, National Gallery of Victoria, McClelland Gallery and Queensland Art Gallery.

Ron Mueck is on display at NGV International on St Kilda Road from 22 January until 18 April 2010.

2002


1958	Ron Mueck is born in Melbourne, Australia.
1978–83	Works as creative director in Australian children's television.
1984	Travels to US then to UK to work in the film industry.
1986	Establishes himself in London and sets up company creating models for film, television and advertising industries.
1996	Asked by painter Paula Rego to create figure of Pinocchio to include in her tableau for <i>Spellbound: Art and Film</i> , held at Hayward Gallery. <i>Pinocchio</i> is seen by prominent art collector Charles Saatchi, who commissions him to make three new sculptures for his collection: <i>Dead Dad</i> , 1996–97; <i>Angel</i> , 1997; and <i>Mask</i> , 1997.
1997	Dead Dad is included in exhibition Sensation: Young British Artists from the Saatchi Collection, which opens at London Royal Academy of the Arts in September.
1998	Mueck starts working with Anthony d'Offay and has his first solo exhibition at the d'Offay Gallery, London in April.
1999	Completes his 4.9 metre high sculpture <i>Boy</i> , 1999, which is installed in <i>The Mind Zone</i> at London's Millennium Dome.
2000	Holds second solo exhibition with d'Offay Gallery in September. Ron is granted a two-year residency as Associate Artist, National Gallery, London. Produces works including <i>Mother and child</i> , 2001; <i>Man in a boat</i> , 2002; <i>Pregnant woman</i> , 2002; and <i>Swaddled baby</i> , 2002.
2001	Boy, 1999, is exhibited at la Biennale di Venezia 49 – the 49th Venice Biennale.

First solo exhibition in Australia held at Museum of Contemporary Art, Sydney in December. The exhibition, based on works produced during residency at the National Gallery, London, also includes *Crouching boy in mirror*, 1999–

2002; Old woman in bed, 2000; and Mask II, 2001.

Smithsonian Institution, Washington DC in July.

2003 Ron Mueck: Making Sculpture at the National Gallery opens at National Gallery, London in March.

Ron Mueck: Hyperreal opens at Nationalgalerie im Hamburger Bahnhof, Museum für Gegenwart, Berlin in September.

Ron Mueck opens at Frans Hals Museum, Haarlem, Netherlands in November.

Pregnant woman, 2002, exhibited at National Gallery of Victoria, Melbourne from 29 January until 27 February, and at Queensland Art Gallery, Brisbane from 12 March until 5 June, in Ron Mueck: The Making of Pregnant Woman, a travelling exhibition organised by National Gallery of Australia, Canberra. Fondation Cartier pour l'Art Contemporain, Paris, presents Ron Mueck in November which includes five new sculptures: In bed, 2005; Mask III, 2005; Spooning couple, 2005; Two women, 2005; and Wild man, 2005

Versions of the Fondation Cartier exhibition travel to the National Galleries of Scotland, Edinburgh, where the new sculpture *A girl*, 2006, is added (5 August – 8 October 2006); Brooklyn Museum, New York (3 November 2006 – 4 February 2007); National Gallery of Canada, Ottawa (2 March – 6 May 2007); Modern Art Museum, Fort Worth, Texas (24 June – 21 October 2007); Andy Warhol Museum, Pittsburgh (13 December 2007 – 30 March 2008) and the 21st Century Museum of Contemporary Art, Kanazawa (26 April – 8 August 2008) – the artist's first major exhibition in Japan.

2007 Special exhibition held for *A girl*, 2006, at the Centro de Arte Contemporáneo de Málaga, Spain in March.

McClelland Gallery + Sculpture Park, Langwarrin, exhibits newly acquired Wild man, 2005, together with *Two women*, 2005, and *Pregnant woman*, 2002, in *Ron Mueck* @ *McClelland* (24 August – 2 November 2008).

Mask II, 2002, included in Statuephilia: Contemporary Sculptors at the British Museum, British Museum, London in October.

2009 Mask III, 2005; Spooning couple, 2005; and Wild man, 2005; featured in ArtistRooms: Ron Mueck at Aberdeen Art Gallery and Museums, Scotland in August.
