

Learning in the Gallery

The extensive NGV Collection and temporary exhibitions of Australian and international historical and contemporary art are a valuable learning resource for teachers and students of all levels and disciplines.

NGV Education programs are designed to improve student learning outcomes through stimulating and engaging learning experiences which have the visual arts at their core. Gallery teaching and learning includes a strong focus on fostering visual literacy, higher order thinking and communication skills and enhancing students' understanding of themselves and the world in which we live.

Programs are planned and presented by experienced educators. They include floor talks and discussions using original works of art in the Gallery, lectures, art making workshops and study days, teacher briefings and professional learning days. Programs are regularly updated in response to new exhibitions and audience needs. NGV Education recognises the distinct learning needs of different stages of learning. Programs are adapted to the levels and requirements of each group.

- The Victorian Early Years Learning and Development Framework

Student programs

The Arts

Introduction to the collection

All levels

This is an ideal art adventure for a first-time visit to the NGV. Students are encouraged to explore, interpret and respond to a range of historical and contemporary works of art from the NGV Collection. Cost \$7

Sketching in the Gallery

All levels

Sketching in front of original works of art is a challenging and exciting activity that helps to develop students' observational skills. In these sessions students will discuss works and be guided through a range of drawing activities to enhance their Gallery visit. Cost \$11 (1.5 hours)

Young philosophers – the art of thinking

All levels

Discover the power of art to inspire creative and divergent thinking. Designed to help students wonder, form questions, opinions and judgements, this creative and critical thinking program will encourage students to think deeply and look adventurously. Through engaging with a range of historical and contemporary works of art students will explore meanings and ideas in works of art and /or discuss and debate questions about art. A range of thinking strategies and tools can be included in the program including *Artful Thinking* routines developed by *Project Zero*, Harvard Graduate School of Education. The session can also be conducted with a focus on a single work of art, or in a community of enquiry format on request.

Digital artist

All levels

Students are invited to bring their digital tablets into the Gallery. Working with an Educator, students explore works of art and use them to inspire their own digital art with apps such as *Drawing* (recommended), *Doodle Buddy*, *Brushes*, *Artrage* or similar. Students create a digital gallery of works to share back at school. Cost \$11 (1.5 hours)

Art in Action – Drama in the gallery!

All levels

Explore art from a new perspective. Engage in a selection of drama, mime, storytelling and music inspired by works of art in the NGV Collection. Teachers are invited to suggest themes that complement their particular drama/music curriculum. **Cost \$**7

Emotions in art

Recommended for Years K-4

Joyous, sad, proud...What feelings does a particular work of art evoke? This program is designed to encourage young students to express themselves, listen to others and explore the emotions conveyed by a variety of works of art. Includes discussion of how colour and other art elements, materials and composition can be used to evoke emotions in art. **Cost \$**7

Emotions in art workshop

Recommended for Years K–4 Be inspired by the expression of emotion in works of art and create your own expressive portrait. Includes one hour Gallery session. Cost \$16 (2 hours)

Every picture tells a story

Recommended for Years K-4 Use observation, thinking and language skills to explore works of art that tell stories. Cost \$7

Every picture tells a story workshop

Recommended for Years K–4 Students create their own work of art that tells a story exploring how art elements and composition can be used to visually communicate ideas. Includes one hour Gallery session. Cost \$16 (2 hours)

Gallery animal hunt and composite creature workshop

Recommended for Years 3–6 Students will explore the Gallery to find and discuss works of art featuring animals, identifying and sketching the unique features of different creatures. They will then use this visual material to create their own composite creature in a workshop session. Cost \$16 (2 hours)



Draw like a master workshop

Recommended for Years 7–12 Artists have always learnt from observing nature and the work of the masters of the past. In this workshop students will view and discuss the work of Old Masters in the Gallery, followed by a drawing workshop in the Education Studio, drawing from natural forms and experimenting with a range of art materials.

Cost \$16 (2 hours)

Apprentice art critic

Recommended for Years 5–10

Art provokes different responses, opinions and questions. Students are invited to voice their views about art by writing and recording their own audio or video review or guide. This program begins with a viewing and discussion in the Gallery to inspire students' thinking about art. Students then refine their ideas, using critical and analytical skills to create their own audio or video review or guide. This program is great for building the language of visual analysis and art criticism. Students require their own tablet or smartphone with relevant apps.

Writing about art

Recommended for Years 7–12, VCE Art & Studio Arts Give your students the tools to write about art with confidence. A short talk giving simple structures and strategies for writing about art will be followed by a practical session in the Gallery modelling art analysis and ideas to generate rich, descriptive writing. Cost \$13 (2 hours)

The art of play

Recommended for Years 9–10 An introduction to the Gallery involving games, fun, adventure, playful and informal exploration, teamwork and problem solving. The program has been designed to actively engage students with the Gallery environment, giving them ownership of their experience and providing new perspectives on the Gallery and its spaces. Students are encouraged to make use of personal mobile phone technologies in the session. An ideal learning experience for students participating in a Melbourne city experience. Cost \$13 (2 hours, NGV International)

Visual Communication in context

Recommended for Vis Com & Design Describe and analyse a range of visual communications within the NGV Collection. Students are encouraged to discuss the historical and cultural factors that influence the way visual communications are designed and the way ideas are communicated, as well as investigate the use of materials and techniques. Cost \$7 (NGV International)

Visual Communication workshop

Recommended for Vis Com & Design Extend your Visual Communication in Context gallery session with a practical workshop. Discuss options tailored to suit your specific curriculum content with an NGV Educator. Cost \$16 (2 hours, NGV International)

The NGV Collection and exhibitions are a valuable resource for all units of the VCE Art and VCE Studio Arts studies. Specialist classes focusing on the key knowledge/skills for Units 1–4 of each study are available. Specific content can be discussed with an NGV Educator but possibilities include:

Study rooms

VCE

View Australian and international works of art from the NGV Collection in one of the Gallery's study rooms. These are specialised and focused sessions for Year 11 and 12 and Tertiary students. Sessions must be booked no less than three weeks in advance. All bookings are limited to maximum of ten people (students and teachers) per session. Up to ten works of art may be selected, in consultation with NGV Educator, for viewing.

International Baccalaureate: Theory of knowledge (TOK)

Explore a range of art works to reflect on the nature of knowledge in the arts, and the significance of shared and individual knowledge to both the artist and viewer, when making knowledge claims about visual art. Consider the relevance of the senses and imagination, as well as the role played by reason, emotion, language, intuition, memory and faith, to both the creation and reception of an artwork. Students will be encouraged to question the impact of forces like history and culture on what we take to be art and the value placed on it by individuals and society, as well as the knowledge connections between the visual arts, other art forms and other subjects in their course.

Teachers are invited to negotiate a program tailored to the requirements of their group and chosen study area. They may also choose to focus on the significance of cultural and contextual elements in an art work in relation to both TOK and their selected Language A literature works in translation. **Cost \$13** (2 hours)

VCAL – Career pathways

Extend horizons by engaging with art. Students will be encouraged to reflect on their place in society and to present their personal point of view about art. We will open doors by discussing pathway opportunities in the arts and related industries, such as Fashion, Interior Design and other careers 'behind-the-scenes' at the NGV. **Cost \$**7

Recommended for Years 4–6

Fri 19 Jun, 10am-2pm

The NGV and the Victorian Association for Philosophy in Schools (VAPS) invites expression of interest from Primary School Teachers for the 2015 Victorian Primary School Philosothon. Schools will be invited to bring 10 students from years 4, 5 and 6 to the NGV to participate in three, thirty minute 'Communities of Inquiry' sessions. These will be held in front of a variety of works of art including one narrative artwork, one portrait and one abstraction. **Cost \$30**

Meet our family

Recommended for Years K–2

Meet families from different places and times through historical and contemporary artworks from a range of cultures. Discover how stories of families and the past can be communicated through works of art and how family life has changed or remained the same over time. **Cost \$7** (NGV International)

Meet our family workshop

Recommended for Years K–2 Be inspired by works of art about families in the NGV and create a portrait of your own family in the NGV Education Studio. Includes a one hour Gallery session. Cost \$16 (NGV International)

Focus on History – AusVELS and Australian Curriculum

Bring history to life through viewing and lively discussion of works in the NGV Collection. Explore works of art as primary sources. Students will analyse a selected range of objects to gain an insight into the past and present societies. What does this object prove? Draw like an Egyptian workshop

Recommended for Years 4–10

Explore ancient Egyptian tombware in the Gallery to discover fascinating stories about life and death in Ancient Egypt and to learn about the conventions that bound Egyptian artists to a continuous tradition for thousands of years. Notice the way the human body was portrayed in Egyptian art and how line, pattern, banding, proportion, symbols and hieroglyphics were used. Following the Gallery viewing and discussion, create your own design for a canopic jar inspired by works viewed in the NGV Collection. **Cost \$16** (2 hours)

Portrait panel painting workshop

Recommended for Year 8

Extend your viewing and discussion of works from Medieval Europe or Renaissance Italy (as above) with a practical workshop in the Education Studio. Students will create their own portrait panel painting inspired by works in the NGV Collection. **Cost \$10**

The Classical World and its Legacy in the NGV Collection

Recommended for Years 4–10

Journey through the ancient world including Egypt and the Near East, ancient Greece and the Greek colonies in Southern Italy and Meso-America. Explore how the art and stories of the ancient world have inspired art and artists from later periods such as John William Waterhouse's *Ulysses and the Sirens* 1891 or Giambatista Tiepolo's *Banquet of Cleopatra* 1743–44. **Cost** \$7

Australian culture and identity

Recommended for Years 4–12 Explore issues relating to society, immigration, history and politics and the impact of the environment on Australian culture. Examine the diversity of Australia's changing society and the contributions made by different cultural groups, including the Indigenous communities. Cost \$7 (NGV Australia)

A Sword in my Hand – Literacy, Art and Humanities link

Recommended for Year 8

The text *A Sword in my hand*, written collaboratively by Jean-Claude Van Rijckeghen & Pat van Beirs, is based on the real life of Marguerite van Male (1348–1405) who was the last Countess of Flanders. This historical novel provides a rich introduction to the Medieval world.

The NGV's Flemish altarpiece, which features members of the house of Burgundy, and other works in the Collection, can be examined as documentary evidence to support the study of *A Sword in my hand* and the role of women in Medieval society. **Cost \$**7

Art, politics and society

Recommended for Years 4–10

Explore dynamic and thought-provoking contemporary works of art to discover the diverse ways that contemporary artists are engaging with local, national and global issues related to political rights, social justice, equality and democracy. Through guided discussion, students use enquiry and critical thinking to evaluate and analyse the ideas presented in the works of art and to discuss and debate the relationship between art, culture and politics.

Gallery session will be tailored to students' age and held at NGV Australia. A related one hour art making workshop complementing this session can be tailored to the needs of your group.

Discuss questions and ideas related to value theory (Area of Study 2, Unit 2, VCE Philosophy)

Opposites

Recommended for K-2

Using a range of works of art, students explore the concept of opposites, using terms as: new and old; big and small; hard and soft; flat and round; 2D and 3D. Students will be encouraged to compare contrasting works by suggesting appropriate language to visually describe these. Students will play Opposite Bingo as they engage with works in the Collection. Cost \$7

Pack your bags, we're going on a journey!

Recommended for P-4

Students are invited to join us as we travel through time to different parts of Australia or the world. Who knows where we might go, what we might discover and who we might meet? Before departure, students will receive a travel diary to log their adventures. These can be used as a basis for follow up writing and artmaking activities at school. Please note: It is suggested that prior to visiting the Gallery teachers read students the book, 'Are we there yet?' by Alison Lester. Cost \$8



The art of English – ekphrastic writing

Recommended for Years 3-10

Students will discover the magic of words and learn literary devices, such as simile, metaphor, and alliteration which can be applied to a variety of writing genres, as they look at, describe and analyse a range of works of art. They will generate ideas and write initial personal responses to these works which may be fully developed into finished pieces at school. Teachers can negotiate a tailor-made writing adventure to include genres of their choice including rap, haiku, limerick, cinquain, feature article, and short story. **Cost \$7** (1 hour) \$13 (2 hours)

Books Alive!

Recommended for Years 7-12 Negotiate a program tailored to your particular English curriculum. Select a text you are studying and explore the key themes and issues it raises by engaging students in analysis and discussion of related works of art. The program can be extended with a related one hour practical art or writing activity. Cost \$7 (1 hour) \$13 (2 hours)

Student programs

Caring for country

All levels

Indigenous Australians have been practising sustainable living for thousands of years. What is that? Scientists at work at the NGV

Recommended for Prep

Designed especially to encourage curiosity and wonder in preps. Students take an exploratory tour of various works of art, collecting data by using scientific language such as hard, soft, long, short, big, small, strong and weak and using terms such as size, shape, colour and weight. They will look for similarities and differences between works of art. **Cost \$**7

What's the weather like at the NGV?

Recommended for Years 1–2

Undertaking a weather tour designed especially for AusVELS level 2 students is a great way to introduce a variety of concepts related to weather patterns. Using a selection of works of art students will study a range of weather characteristics, such as rain, heat, snow and wind. Opportunities abound for students to hypothesise and use scientific inquiry to discover the effects that varying weather has on living and non-living things. **Cost \$**7

Chemical Science: Conservation and art

Recommended for Year 10

What is cultural materials conservation? Discover why and how objects are conserved. Learn about the scientific methods used to analyse and treat artworks to slow down the process of deterioration and determine their provenance and authenticity. Gain insights into the relationship between chemistry and art by discussing how the pigments, supports, mediums and materials an artist chooses determine conservation treatments. **Cost \$7**

VCE Outdoor and Environmental Studies: The changing land

VCE

Explore the physical changes that have taken place in the Australian landscape over the past two hundred years. Observe the impacts of European settlement, agricultural practices and gold mining on the land as represented in Australian landscape painting. Discuss the changing interactions and relationships with the land.



Art, politics and society

Recommended for Years 4–10

Explore dynamic and thought-provoking contemporary works of art to discover the diverse ways that contemporary Indigenous artists are engaging with local, national and global issues related to political rights, social justice, equality and democracy. Through guided discussion, students use enquiry and critical thinking to evaluate and analyse the ideas presented in the works of art and to discuss and debate the relationship between art, culture and politics. Recommended for Years 3–10 Encounter inspiring works of art that explore stories from sacred texts and express religious beliefs and experience. Explore how artists represent the beauty and richness of religious experience and tradition through colour, body language and symbols. Cost \$7 (NGV International)

Indigenous Art and Spirituality

Recommended for Years 4–10 Indigenous art demonstrates the continuing link with country and is rich with spiritual and political intent. Students will engage with contemporary and traditional works that will challenge and inspire. Available Term 2–4, 2015 Cost \$7 (NGV Australia)

Saints and Other Inspiring Souls

Recommended for Years 4–10

What makes a person inspire hearts and minds? Hear sacred stories of lives of saints such as St Catherine, St Barbara and St Jerome. How are women of faith, such as Mary the Mother of Jesus portrayed? How do artists imagine Old Testament figures such as Moses, David and Queen Esther? Consider saints, or great beings from a range of faith traditions. What virtues are portrayed?
