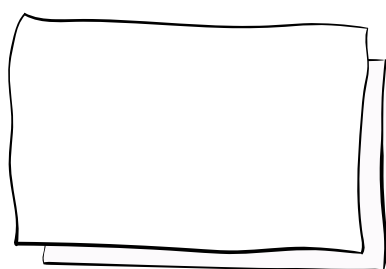


PARLOUR GAMES

In Victorian times families played games in lounge rooms called parlours. **Gather your family and play these games together!**

BLINDFOLDED DRAWING

This is a game for two or more players. All you need are paper, pencils and blindfolds!



How to play

- 1 Select a person to read aloud the description of the picture below.
- 2 The rest of the group listens and draws while wearing blindfolds.

DESCRIPTION

This description is for the reader's eyes only!

- Firstly, draw a big circle on the page.
- Inside the circle, draw two very small circles in the middle.
- Above the two tiny circles, draw two bigger circles.
- Inside each of the two bigger circles, draw a smaller circle.
- Now, add a banana shape underneath the two tiny circles that are in the middle of the big circle.
- Next, draw lots of squiggly lines on top of the big circle.
- When you've finished, add two straight lines like the number 11 at the bottom of the big circle.
- Finally, draw a jellybean shape on each side of the big circle.

- 3 Now everyone can take off their blindfold to reveal a face! Who did the best drawing? Try making up your own combinations too!

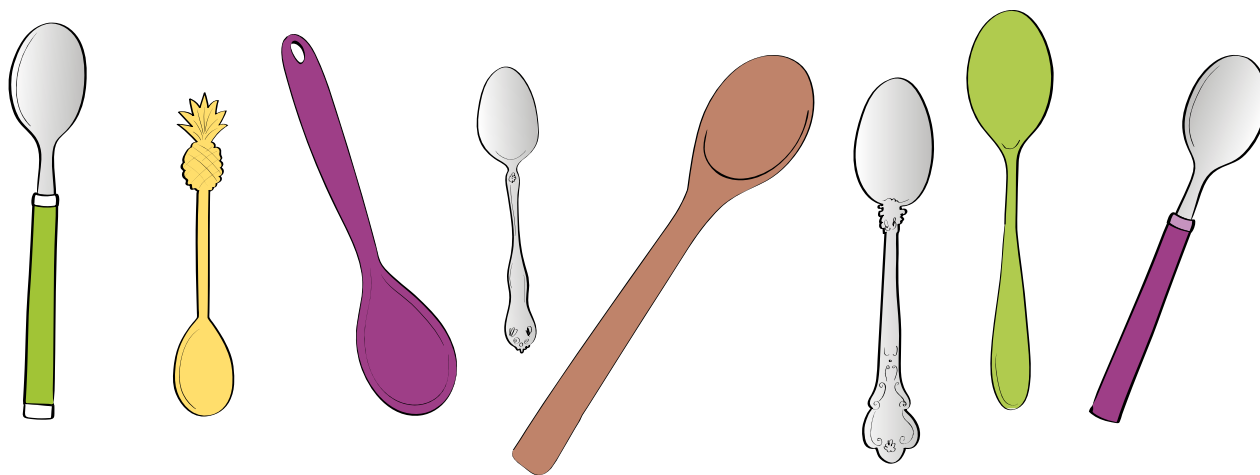
