Danielle Brustman is an interior designer. She makes indoor spaces beautiful by carefully selecting colours, lighting and materials.

Danielle has created an installation for NGV Triennial called *Coloured In* as well as designs for the exhibition *Spectrum: An Exploration of Colour*. She was inspired by a French architect called Le Corbusier who invented a colour keyboard for finding colours that work well together.

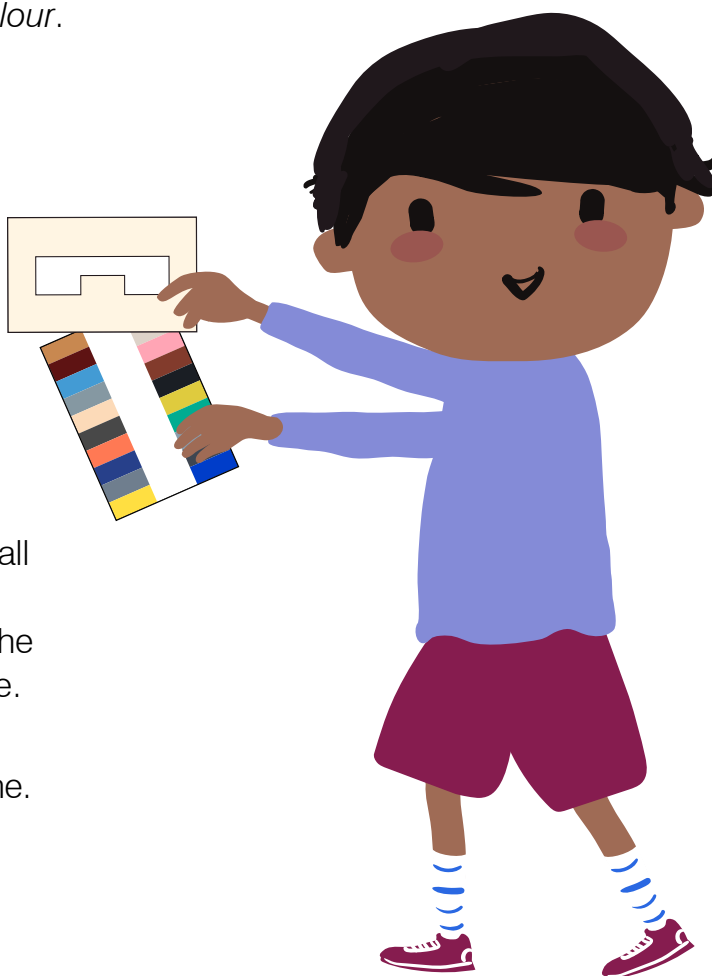
Let's make a colour keyboard and use it to colour in some beautiful objects from *Spectrum: An Exploration of Colour*.

You will need:

- * A colour printout of this activity sheet
- * Scissors
- * Pencils or coloured markers

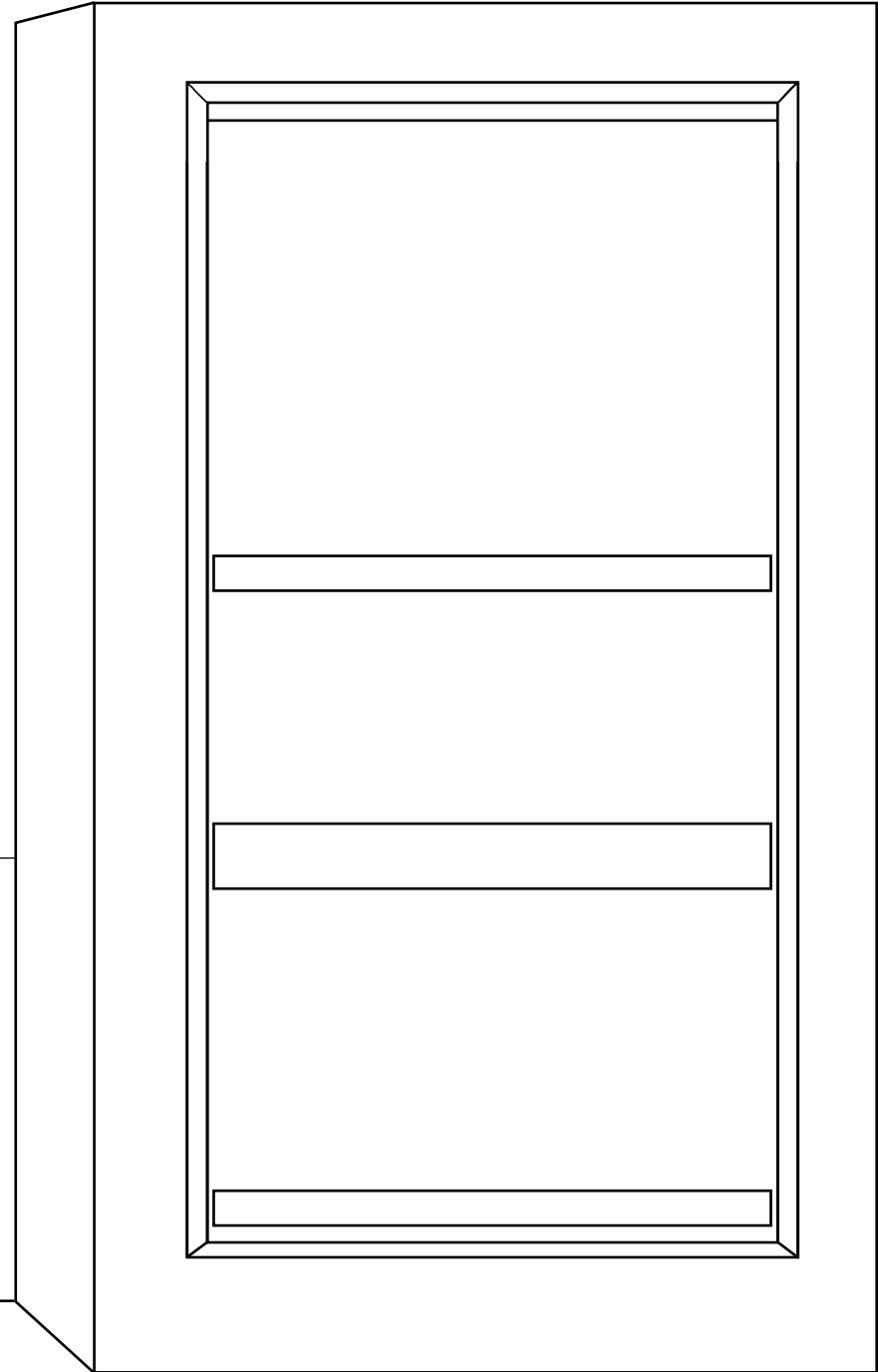
Get started

- 1 Cut down the central line on page 3. You will be left with two templates.
- 2 Cut out the inside of the keyboard frame by softly folding it in half. Then make a small cut along the line, working your scissors inside the cut and removing the inside of the frame. You will be left with an empty frame. Ask an adult for help if you need to.
- 3 Cut off the excess paper around your frame.
- 4 Place your frame on top of the colour key-board and slide it up and down the keyboard, until you find your favourite combination of four colours.
- 5 You're ready to draw using your colour combination. Don't worry if the colours aren't exactly the same – you might like to see if you can find these colours in the world around you.

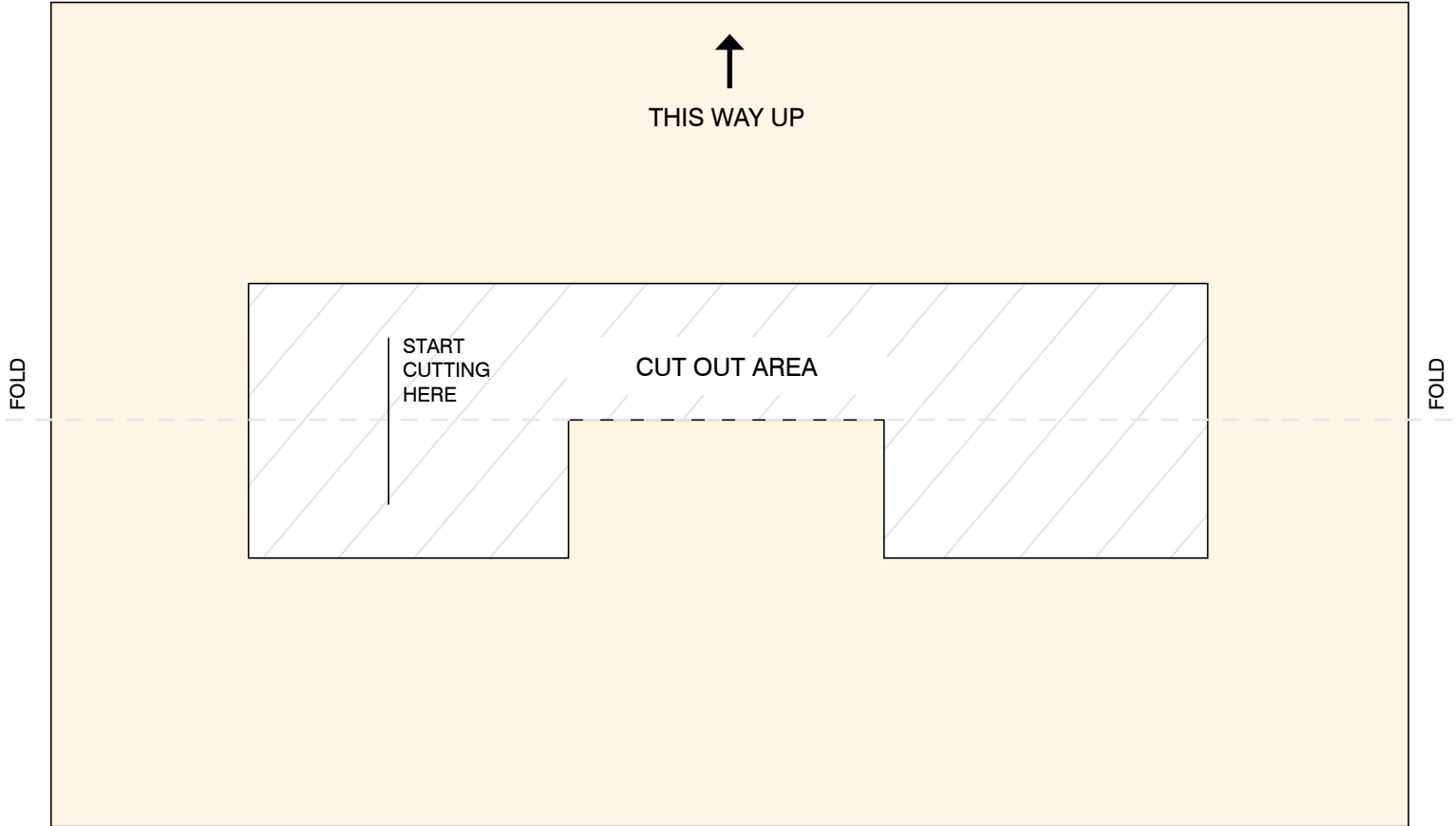

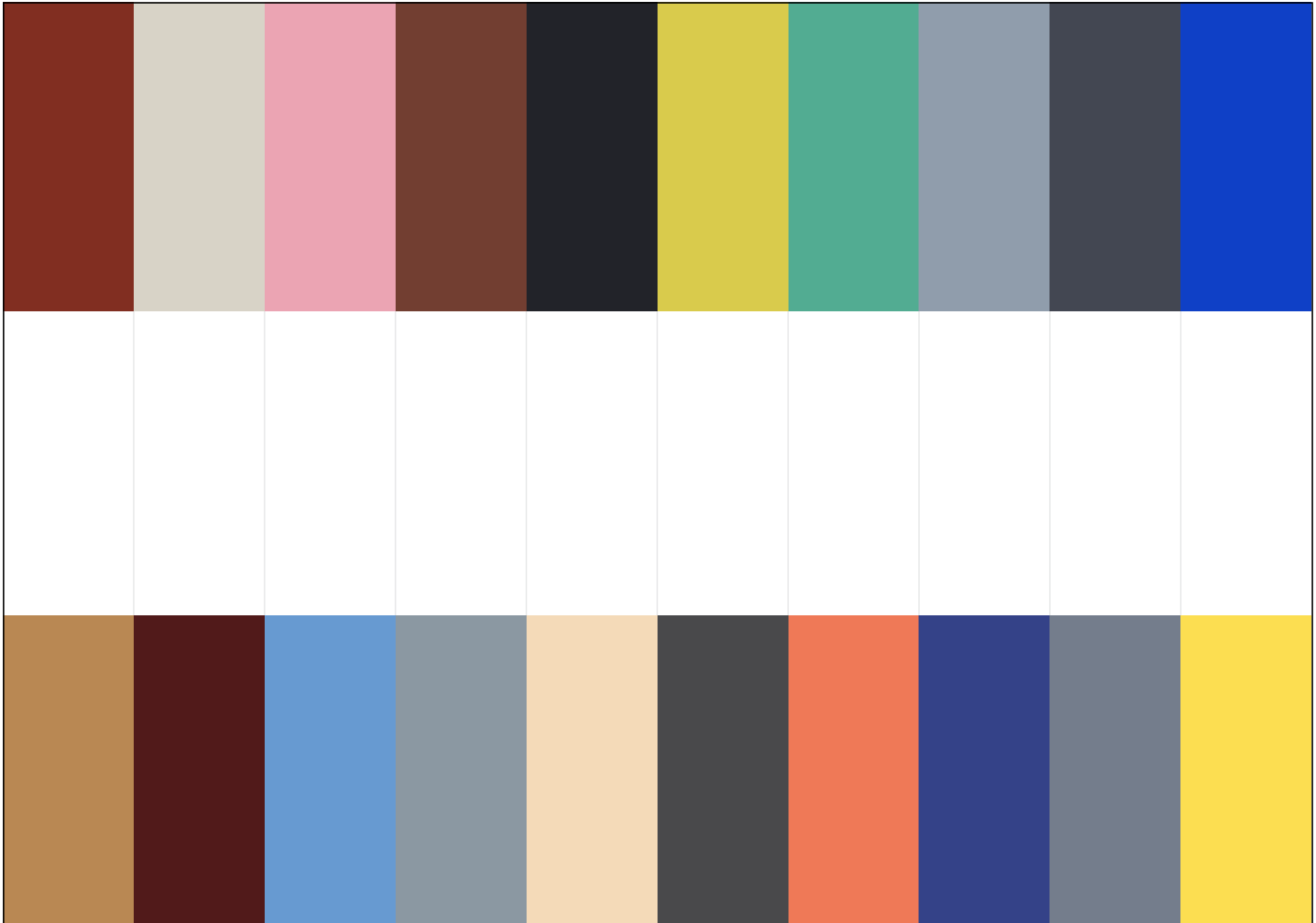


KEYBOARD FRAME
