

About Suyeon

Get inspired

Suyeon produces art that she intends to create a feeling of tranquility and jolliness. Spend some time looking at examples of art and illustration. What images do you like? Why do you like them? What sort of feelings or emotions do they inspire?

Experiment with style

Draw your subject a few times and try to make your illustrations look as different as possible. You could use heavy thick lines, or thin whispy lines, bright colours or only one colour. Suyeon includes many details in her illustrations and experiments with objects, figures, colours and shapes.



What is an illustrator?

An illustrator is responsible for creating two-dimensional images to communicate ideas. Illustrators work for clients such as advertisers, brands, magazines, and publishers. Their work appears across different formats including books, signage, packaging, websites, and flyers.

Decide on your subject

What stories do you want to tell through your illustration? You might like to consider everyday objects, a favourite memory or something you have seen today. Suyeon likes to illustrate the happiest memories of her childhood, especially those from Korea. What is special to you? What makes you happy?

Refine Your illustration

Choose your favourite illustration and repeat it a few times to refine your technique. When you are happy with the finished product, re-create it on sticker paper.
